





Taxation in Norway

The tax year in Norway is the calendar year, and tax returns must be filed by April 30 of the following year. For employees, taxes are typically withheld by the employer and paid directly to the tax authorities on a monthly basis. For self-employed individuals and businesses, taxes are paid on a quarterly basis. Payment can be made electronically or through the use of a tax payment slip. Late payments are subject to interest and penalties.



Company Maintenance Fees in Norway: What You Need to Know



In Norway, companies are subject to annual maintenance requirements that include certain fees and obligations to ensure compliance with local laws. One of the primary ongoing costs is the annual filing of the company's financial statements with the Brønnøysund Register Centre, which is the official government registry for Norwegian businesses. This filing is mandatory for all companies and helps maintain the company's legal status. While the exact government fee for filing may vary, it is generally a modest amount when converted to USD.
