# Economy of Swaziland



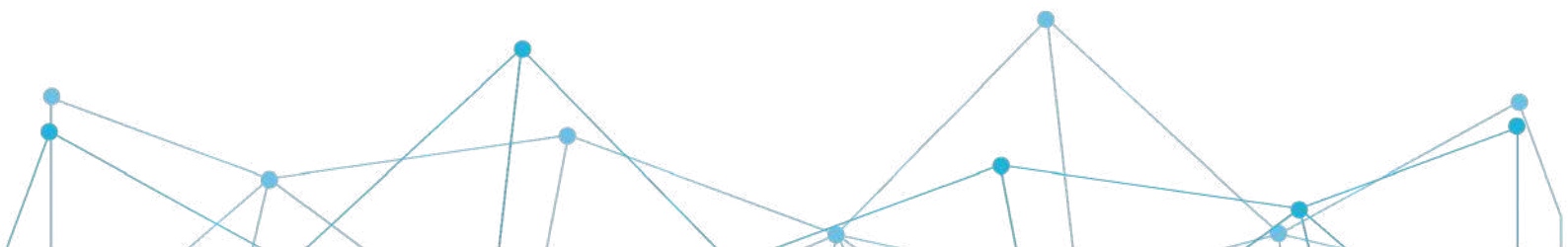

# Taxation in Swaziland
